6. BUSINESS ITEMS:

A. REVIEW AND FINALIZE THE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR POTENTIAL CHANGES TO SEASIDE MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 2.28 RECREATION AND COMMISSION TO PRESENT TO THE CITY COUNCIL FOR CONSIDERATION:

* Staff gave the background of Section 2.28. The Recreation and Park Commission was established on October 13, 1954. In May 1990 Chapter 2.28 was amended and deleted entirely, and a new Chapter 2.28, including duties A-F, was hereby added to the Seaside Municipal Code. In 2004, to qualify for Tree City USA status, the city needed to amend Chapter 2.28 and G-L duties

were added to the ordinance. Staff stated that there has been lengthy discussions about the ordinance over the last three Parks & Recreation Commission meetings. Commissioner Lobo provided a work plan which was adopted and approved by the Commission. Per Commissioner Lobo's recommendations the Commissioners deleted the current duties and added the duties she recommended. Then at the last meeting, the Commissioner had a discussion to change some of the language and combine G-L duties. Please see the attached final draft for more information.

* Commissioner Lobo asked when the recommended ordinance changes would go to the City Council for consideration. Staff stated the earliest would be October 05, 2024 or November 07, 2024. Commissioner Lobo stated one of her recommendations to the Neighborhood Improvement Commission was to receive a percentage of the Transient Occupancy Tax to facilitate the Parks & Recreation Master Plan. However, after doing more research, the City has two tax measures (measure L and R) that allocates a certain amount for recreation and parks. At this time, the funds for these two measure goes into the general fund account. Commissioner Lobo would like to know what the City is collecting right now from measure L and R to see if they can plug some of the funds into into their ordinance. That way they would have secure yearly funds for the Parks and Recreation Commission and not have to go to the Neighborhood Improvement Commission. Commissioner Lobo would like to have a special meeting or move this to the October meeting to discuss how to get yearly funding from the two measures for the Parks and Recreation projects in their Master Plan.

* No Public Comment.

* Commissioner voted on the motion: "To move this item to the October 21, 2024 Regular Parks & Recreation Commission meeting so they can discuss it further." Karla Lobo/Dianne Nielson M/S/P

B. DISCUSS IDEAS FOR THE POTENTIAL ALLOCATION OF FUNDS FROM THE NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENT COMMISSION:

* Chair Maxwell stated that he went to the Neighborhood Improvement Commission meeting on September 12, 2024. At that meeting they were going to review their 2024/25 work plan. The City Manager spoke at their meeting and advised them to give the other commissions a chance to present projects to them before their September 26, 2024 meeting. There is approximately \$142,000.00 from a total of \$398,000.00 in resources not yet designated for any particular project. They plan to divvy it up between different five groups.

* Staff stated that it has been recommended that a copy of the presentation be submitted to the Neighborhood Improvement Commission a day before their meeting (September 25, 2024). They would like the Chair's from each Commission to present their project.

* Vice Chair Nielson stated that they will present their the Parks & Recreation Commission project on September 26, 2024 and the Neighborhood Improvement Commission plans to go to the City Council on October 03, 2024. The time frame is great.

- * Vice Chair Nielson shared her two project ideas to present to the Neighborhood Improvement Commission. One of her project ideas was to have an adult fitness course installed in one of the city's parks. This would benefit adults by having access to health and fitness activities outdoors. She stated that Lincoln Cunningham Park would be a good park to have an adult fitness course. The approximate cost of the fitness course equipment is \$27,000.00. Please see the attached pictures for more details. The second project idea that Vice Chair Nielson had was a multipurpose water fountain/water refill station with a pet fountain. These are important healthy park amenities that should be installed in one or two of the city's parks. The approximate cost of two water stations is \$12,400.00. Please see the attached pictures for more details.
- * Commissioner Lobo stated that she likes Vice Chair Nielson's project ideas. She suggested that they ask for two adult fitness course equipment for two different accessible parks. She loved the water fountain with the pet fountain. She is not sure how they would get water for that. She thinks the fountains would be beneficial and they should ask for two. Havana Soliz Park might be an option.
- * Chair Maxwell stated he agrees about the adult fitness course equipment and the multipurpose water fountain/water refill station with a pet fountain. Lincoln Cunningham Park is good, however, the water is an issue. Laguna Grande Park might be an option.
- * Staff and the Commissioners discussed the cost of the equipment and the approximate cost for the installation. Vice Chair Nielson will write up the presentation and Chair Maxwell will go to the Neighborhood Improvement Commission meeting on September 26, 2024 and present the Parks & Recreation Commission projects to them.
- * No Public Comment.
- * Commissioner voted on the motion: "Recommend to the Neighborhood Improvement Commission two adult fitness course and two multipurpose water fountain/water refill station with a pet station and prioritizing Lincoln Cunningham Park. The Chair and Vice Chair will review the information and make the recommendation on their own to submit."

8. REPORTS FROM RECREATION STAFF:

- * Staff reported that "Oaxaca by the Sea" is on Sunday, September 22, 2024 from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at City Hall Lawn. The City's 70's birthday celebration is on October 13, 2024 from 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Sky Elements will be doing a 12 minute drone show over Roberts Lake.

9. REPORTS FROM PARKS STAFF:

- * Staff that the Wheeler Street Tennis Courts are completed with Pickleball. There are four pickleball courts and three tennis courts. The courts are packed and they are having fun. That was Neighborhood Improvement Commission funding that helped make that happen. At Lincoln Cunningham Park, there will be a ground

breaking on Monday, September 30, 2024 at 3:30 p.m. for the trail project with construction starting on October 01, 2024. The project at Havana Soliz Park is complete for the picnic area. The Havana Soliz Park Revitalization Project Ribbon Cutting is on Saturday, September 21, 2024 at 12:00 p.m. The volleyball court is complete. Staff is still working on getting a new high quality net for the volleyball court and then they will be installing a fence for safety. Cutino Park plan project for the next fiscal year is to paint the conex storages and sandblast the concrete in front of them. There was a press release that went out about the individual that did the vandalism at Capra Park. FOSPA has been to the park cleaning it up and trying to bring it back. There might be some funds coming in to help make that park whole again. At Mescal Neil Park, a water tank was installed and some fencing was replaced and a new BBQ was installed. The design for the San Pablo Bridge is being finalized. The demolition is expected to start in late October 2024. The swing set at Sabado Park has been installed. A new picnic table was installed at Pacchetti Dog Park.

10. REPORTS FROM COMMISSIONERS:

- * Commissioner Lobo stated that National Hispanic Heritage Month started on September 15, 2024. El Salvador Independence Day was on September 15, 2024. Mexican Independence Day is on September 16, 2024. She stated she was at the ground breaking for the new Hyatt at the Bayonet & Black Horse Golf Course. There is a Monterey Bay FC soccer game on Saturday, September 21, 2024 that will highlight heritage night.
- * Vice Chair Nielson stated she went to the 911 Ceremony on September 11, 2024 at City Hall Lawn. It was very heartfelt. She goes to every FOSPA's park clean-up days on Saturday. She plans to go to "Oaxaca by the Sea" on Sunday, September 22, 2024.
- * Commission White stated he is glad to see all the project and how well they are doing.
- * Chair Maxwell thanked everyone for all their hard work and how they have made a big difference in Seaside's community.

PURPOSE

Review and finalize the potential changes to the Seaside Municipal Code Section 2.28 Recreation and Park Commission to present to the City Council for consideration.

BACKGROUND

The Recreation and Park commission was established on October 13, 1954. On May 17, 1990, Chapter 2.28 was amended and deleted entirely, and a new chapter 2.28, including duties A-F, was hereby added to the Seaside Municipal Code. In 2004, to qualify for Tree City USA status, the City needed to amend Chapter 2.28 of the Seaside Municipal Code Recreation and Park Commission to incorporate language into the ordinance to meet the standards for Tree City USA status. Duties G-L were added to the ordinance.

While the Parks & Recreation Commission worked on updating and making changes to their 2024/25 work plan at their June 2024 meeting, they felt it was important to update and make changes to the Seaside Municipal Code Section 2.28 recreation and Park Commission. The Commissioners reviewed and discussed the potential changes at their July 2024 meeting. They felt they needed more time to review Section 2.28 and voted on having a study session to complete the updates and make potential recommendations. At their August 2024 meeting, they had their study session to review and discuss the proposed changes and recommendations to Section 2.28 Duties. The

Commissioners will review the final draft and finalize their recommendations. Updating and making changes to the ordinance is important, so it can reflect the most current information, policies, and duties of the commission.

Proposed Changes

A. Background

 - *Develop and review annually a long range plan for trees and parks, both naturally occurring and planned.*
 - *Review, in cooperation with other city commissions, plans for landscaping, planting , trails, etc*
 - *Coordinate or conduct planned projects for the advancement of trees parks, and other outdoor recreational areas*
 - *In collaboration with other city commissions inform residents regarding landscape projects and care.*

- *The mission of the Seaside Recreation and Parks commission is to promote and advocate for parks and recreation services in an advisory capacity, to advance and*

preserve parks and recreation services , and to ensure safe parks and recreation facilities are available for all residents and visitors to the city of Seaside. (current)

As an on-going activity, serve as the recommending body surrounding matters dealing with bike and pedestrian safety on the Bike and Pedestrian Advisory Committee.

CIP Program Recommendation: Spur Trail and Regional Connectivity

Timeline: Ongoing

Areas of interest:

- Work on recommendations for regional connection between Big Sur, Carmel, Salinas, and the BART station in the foreseeable future
- Identify connectivity locations.
- Prioritize the locations based on feasibility, need, and community interest.

Participants: sub-committee

Staff Lead: Director of Civil Engineer, Recreation Director

c. Programs and Fees.

Annually review recreation programs and fees. If any, the Parks and Recreation Commission will make recommendations to the City Council regarding Parks and Recreation operation, programming, fees for service, development impact fees, and rental fees. 2.28.010 Created.

There is created a **recreation and park commission**. (Ord. [773](#) § 1 (Exh. A), 1990)

2.28.020 Composition and terms of office.

The **recreation and park commission** shall consist of nine regular members. The appointed members of the **commission** shall hold office for three years. (Ord. [1067](#) § 2, 2019; Ord. [971](#) § 2, 2008; Ord. [887](#) § 2, 2000; Ord. [773](#) § 1 (Exh. A), 1990)

2.28.030 Duties.

The duties of the **recreation and park commission** shall be to:

- ~~A. Act in an advisory capacity to the city council, director of community services, the boards of trustees of the school districts and the director of community services in all matters pertaining to parks and public recreation, and to cooperate with other governmental agencies and civic groups in the advancement of sound park and recreation planning and programming;~~
- ~~B. Recommend policies on recreational services and facilities to the director of community services and the city council;~~
- ~~C. Consult with the director of community services on matters relating to the administration and development of recreation areas, facilities, programs and improved recreation services;~~
- ~~D. Make periodic inventories of recreation services that exist or may be needed and interpret the needs of the public to the city council, the school boards of trustees and to the director of community services;~~
- ~~E. Aid in coordinating recreation services with the programs of other public agencies and voluntary organizations;~~
- ~~F. Advise the director of community services in the preparation of the annual budget and a long-range recreation capital improvement program;~~
- ~~G. Advise the city council on matters regarding trees, urban forestation endeavors and related resources;~~
- ~~H. Develop, keep current, and aid in the facilitation of a plan for the development, conservation and care of urban forest resources;~~
- ~~I. Develop and review annually a long-range plan for urban forestation;~~

- ~~J. Review, in cooperation with the city forester, annual plans for urban forestry programs;~~
- ~~K. Coordinate or conduct planned projects for the advancement of the urban forest;~~
- ~~L. In collaboration with the city forester, inform residents regarding tree planning, tree care, and forestry programs. (Ord. 938, 2004; Ord. 773 § 1 (Exh. A), 1990)~~

Replace **2.28.030 Duties A-L** with

- A. To recommend to the city council the establishment of an adequate system of parks, playgrounds and any other recreation facility which the commission may deem advisable including operation, management and maintenance of such facilities and the acquisition of necessary equipment;
- B. To recommend to the city council the acquisition of such real and personal property as may be necessary or advisable for recreational facilities;
- C. To recommend and make suggestions concerning any matter pertaining to parks, playgrounds and other recreational facilities which may be brought before the city council;
- D. To recommend fees or charges to be paid by residents and nonresidents for the use of city recreational facilities;
- E. Facilitate input and/or concerns from the community, which pertain to parks and recreation facilities, new and existing programs/events, and youth/adult sports field user groups within the City of Seaside;
- F. Facilitate input and/or concerns from youth/adult sports field user groups in regards to the condition and use of Seaside athletic facilities.
- G. Advise the city council on matters regarding trees, urban forestation endeavors and related resources, which may include; development of a long-range plan, conservation and care of urban forest resources, and the coordination of projects and plans for urban forestry programs.
- H. In collaboration with the public works department and/or other tree specialists, inform residents regarding tree planning, tree care, and forestry programs. (Ord. 938, 2004; Ord. 773 § 1 (Exh. A), 1990)

PURPOSE

BACKGROUND

Each year the Neighborhood Improvement Commission receives funds from the Transient Occupancy Tax for their work plan. Last year, the Neighborhood Improvement Commission allocated funds to the Parks & Recreation Commission for their Trees in the Park Project and their Residential Free Tree Giveaway Program, and to upgrade the Wheeler Street Tennis Courts.

In addition, they allocated funding to other City Commissions for projects to be completed prior to the end of the fiscal year. The Commissioners would like to discuss different ideas for the potential allocation of funds from the Neighborhood Improvement Commission for future projects.

AND COMMISSION TO PRESENT TO THE CITY
COUNCIL FOR CONSIDERATION**

PURPOSE

Review and finalize the potential changes to the Seaside Municipal Code Section 2.28 Recreation and Park Commission to present to the City Council for consideration.

BACKGROUND

The Recreation and Park commission was established on October 13, 1954. On May 17, 1990, Chapter 2.28 was amended and deleted entirely, and a new chapter 2.28, including duties A-F, was hereby added to the Seaside Municipal Code. In 2004, to qualify for Tree City USA status, the City needed to amend Chapter 2.28 of the Seaside Municipal Code Recreation and Park Commission to incorporate language into the ordinance to meet the standards for Tree City USA status. Duties G-L were added to the ordinance.

While the Parks & Recreation Commission worked on updating and making changes to their 2024/25 work plan at their June 2024 meeting, they felt it was important to update and make changes to the Seaside Municipal Code Section 2.28 recreation and Park Commission. The Commissioners reviewed and discussed the potential changes at their July 2024 meeting. They felt they needed more time to review Section 2.28 and voted on having a study session to complete the updates and make potential recommendations. At their August 2024 meeting, they had their study session to review and discuss the proposed changes and recommendations to Section 2.28 Duties. At

their September 2024 meeting they talked about tax measures L and R to see if it is possible to get money allocated to the Parks & Recreation Commission for park improvements yearly. The Commissioners will review the final draft and finalize their recommendations. Updating and making changes to the ordinance is important, so it can reflect the most current information, policies, and duties of the commission.

Proposed Changes

A. Background

- Established Oct 13, 1954
- Duties of Commission (12 listed)
 - *To act in an advisory capacity to the city council, recreation director and the board of trustees of the school districts and to cooperate with the other governmental agencies and civic groups in the advancement of sound park and recreation planning and programming*
 - *Recommend policies on recreational services and facilities to the recreation director and the city council*
 - *Consult with the recreation director on matters relating to the administration and development of recreation areas, facilities programs and improvements*
 - *Make periodic inventories of recreation services that exist or may be needed and interpret the needs of the public to the city council, the school boards of trustees and to the recreation director*
 - *Aid in coordinating recreation services with the programs of other public agencies and voluntary organizations*
 - *Advise the recreation director in the preparation of the annual budget and a long range recreation capital improvements program*
 - *Advise the city council on matters regarding trees, plants, landscape, etc.*
 - *Develop, keep current and aid in the facilitation of a plan for the development conservation and care of trees, trails, and parks.*
 - *Develop and review annually a long range plan for trees and parks, both naturally occurring and planned.*
 - *Review, in cooperation with other city commissions, plans for landscaping, planting , trails, etc*
 - *Coordinate or conduct planned projects for the advancement of trees parks, and other outdoor recreational areas*
 - *In collaboration with other city commissions inform residents regarding landscape projects and care.*

B. Current Mission Statement

- *The mission of the Seaside Recreation and Parks commission is to promote and advocate for parks and recreation services in an advisory capacity, to advance and*

preserve parks and recreation services , and to ensure safe parks and recreation facilities are available for all residents and visitors to the city of Seaside. (current)

- **Proposed Value**

- *All meetings shall be conducted in a courteous, professional, and efficient manner, and all persons in attendance shall comport themselves in a manner befitting the proceedings.*
 - *Speaking without the Chair's permission or speaking out of turn in the course of any discussion is not acceptable and may be ruled out of order.*
 - *Obscene language or gestures, excessively loud tones, personal attacks, or any other threatening speech or actions are unacceptable and shall be ruled out of order.*

- *Repetitive or unduly argumentative testimony or discussion is not acceptable and may be ruled out of order.*
- *Focus within the scope of the Parks & Recreation Commission, and be respectful of other Commissioners' time.*

C. Work Plan Proposals

a. Advisory Body to the City Council.

As an on-going activity, serve as the recommending body for matters as defined in the Municipal Code. Keep abreast of current and emerging issues in parks and recreation. Use information to amend work plan if needed or save projects for future work plan.

Timeline: Ongoing

Staff Lead: Recreation Director .

b. Advisory Body for Active Transportation Plan.(sub committee perhaps)(**CIP**)

As an on-going activity, serve as the recommending body surrounding matters dealing with bike and pedestrian safety on the Bike and Pedestrian Advisory Committee.

CIP Program Recommendation: Spur Trail and Regional Connectivity

Timeline: Ongoing

Areas of interest:

- Work on recommendations for regional connection between Big Sur, Carmel, Salinas, and the BART station in the foreseeable future
- Identify connectivity locations.
- Prioritize the locations based on feasibility, need, and community interest.

Participants: sub-committee

Staff Lead: Director of Civil Engineer, Recreation Director

c. Programs and Fees.

Annually review recreation programs and fees. If any, the Parks and Recreation Commission will make recommendations to the City Council regarding Parks and Recreation operation, programming, fees for service, development impact fees, and rental fees. On request by Council and/or staff, or as the Commission deems appropriate, conduct an evaluation of Parks and Recreation Programs and Fees. Provide consideration and recommendations to the City Council.

Timeline: Ongoing

Areas of interest:

- The Commission will request data from the Recreation Director for the January meetings.
- January 2025- Review the recreation program and fees at the January meeting.

Staff Lead:Recreation Director

d. Staff Support and Community Enrichment.

Provide support to Parks and Recreation staff in managing the prioritization of demand for limited park and recreation resources. Recommend and support staff

in enhancing the City's events, parks, playgrounds, and other recreation programs and facilities.

Timeline: August 2024- May 2025

2.28.010 Created.

There is created a **recreation** and park **commission**. (Ord. [773](#) § 1 (Exh. A), 1990)

2.28.020 Composition and terms of office.

The **recreation** and park **commission** shall consist of nine regular members. The appointed members of the **commission** shall hold office for three years. (Ord. [1067](#) § 2, 2019; Ord. [971](#) § 2, 2008; Ord. [887](#) § 2, 2000; Ord. [773](#) § 1 (Exh. A), 1990)

2.28.030 Duties.

The duties of the **recreation** and park **commission** shall be to:

- A. ~~Act in an advisory capacity to the city council, director of community services, the boards of trustees of the school districts and the director of community services in all matters pertaining to parks and public recreation, and to cooperate with other governmental agencies and civic groups in the advancement of sound park and recreation planning and programming;~~
- B. ~~Recommend policies on recreational services and facilities to the director of community services and the city council;~~
- C. ~~Consult with the director of community services on matters relating to the administration and development of recreation areas, facilities, programs and improved recreation services;~~
- D. ~~Make periodic inventories of recreation services that exist or may be needed and interpret the needs of the public to the city council, the school boards of trustees and to the director of community services;~~
- E. ~~Aid in coordinating recreation services with the programs of other public agencies and voluntary organizations;~~
- F. ~~Advise the director of community services in the preparation of the annual budget and a long-range recreation capital improvement program;~~
- G. ~~Advise the city council on matters regarding trees, urban forestation endeavors and related resources;~~
- H. ~~Develop, keep current, and aid in the facilitation of a plan for the development, conservation and care of urban forest resources;~~
- I. ~~Develop and review annually a long-range plan for urban forestation;~~

- ~~J. Review, in cooperation with the city forester, annual plans for urban forestry programs;~~
- ~~K. Coordinate or conduct planned projects for the advancement of the urban forest;~~
- ~~L. In collaboration with the city forester, inform residents regarding tree planning, tree care, and forestry programs. (Ord. [938](#), 2004; Ord. [773](#) § 1 (Exh. A), 1990)~~

Replace **2.28.030 Duties A-L** with

- A. To recommend to the city council the establishment of an adequate system of parks, playgrounds and any other recreation facility which the commission may deem advisable including operation, management and maintenance of such facilities and the acquisition of necessary equipment;
- B. To recommend to the city council the acquisition of such real and personal property as may be necessary or advisable for recreational facilities;
- C. To recommend and make suggestions concerning any matter pertaining to parks, playgrounds and other recreational facilities which may be brought before the city council;
- D. To recommend fees or charges to be paid by residents and nonresidents for the use of city recreational facilities;
- E. Facilitate input and/or concerns from the community, which pertain to parks and recreation facilities, new and existing programs/events, and youth/adult sports field user groups within the City of Seaside;
- F. Facilitate input and/or concerns from youth/adult sports field user groups in regards to the condition and use of Seaside athletic facilities.
- G. Advise the city council on matters regarding trees, urban forestation endeavors and related resources, which may include; development of a long-range plan, conservation and care of urban forest resources, and the coordination of projects and plans for urban forestry programs.
- H. In collaboration with the public works department and/or other tree specialists, inform residents regarding tree planning, tree care, and forestry programs. (Ord. 938, 2004; Ord. 773 § 1 (Exh. A), 1990)
