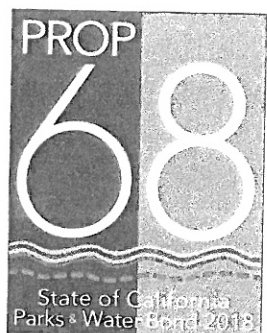

CPRS Legislative Priorities:

- Support efforts to provide funding for the rehabilitation, development and capital improvements for local and state park improvements in order to enhance the active and passive recreational infrastructures in the state.
- Support the enactment of policies and encourage state funding opportunities to assist agencies in meeting sustainability objectives including energy and water efficiencies, active transportation enhancements, connectivity and mobility improvements and carbon sequestration through natural landscape management and protection.
- Oppose legislation that has a negative impact on the administration of park and recreation services and resource management including the sale of park lands and open space, relaxations of park dedication fee requirements and the imposition of regulatory or statutory requirements that provide no added protections or benefit to California's recreational consumer.
- Support access opportunities for all Californians to physical activity, proper nutrition and healthy lifestyle options through the promotion of active transportation, complete street implementation, healthy foods, youth programming and maximizing the usage of green space in urban/suburban and rural settings for personal enjoyment.

2. **ROLL CALL - ESTABLISHMENT OF QUORUM**

3. **PUBLIC COMMENT**

- Lisa Anne Sawhney stated her concerns for Cutino Park Plan specifically regarding the cost and long term financial liability with bonding and also the lack of PRC involvement. She also indicated she would like to see more collaboration with the MPUSD MOU. She thanked those who worked on Leslie Park cleanup effort.

4. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

A. **July 16, 2018 Minutes**

Lisa Anne Sawhney requested changes be made to page four of the minutes to reflect the addition to her public comment related to the location at to include more than movie screening at the location of Broadway and Fremont to include dancing and music and public activities appropriate for a public square.

MSP: Gray/White: To approve the August 20, 2018 agenda with corrections.

5. **REVIEW OF AGENDA**

6. **BUSINESS ITEMS**

A. **WELCOME THE NEW COMMISSIONER**

Michael Evans was introduced to the Commission.

B. **DISCUSS TOPICS THAT WERE BROUGHT UP AT THE SEASIDE CHAT**

Comments received from the Commissioners.

- Seaside Chats: Commissioner Evans discussed the need for recycle can sat each park and the possibility of placing dog waste receptacles at the parks.
- Suggestion to do an ADA study for each park and that would take the main hurdle out of the way so time could be spent on the design.
- Staff mentioned working closely with FOSPA and announced the meeting is held on 4th

Monday at 6:00 p.m. at Oldemeyer Center.

- Suggested the establishment of an order of which parks should be taken care of in terms of priority.
- The possibility of using GIS and census data could be useful and could be worked on.
- One park should be finished at a time.
- A suggestion was made to copycat the city's street plan format might be helpful. Somehow develop a mechanism that would rate each park similar to what was done with the streets.
- Suggested to re look at the City's Parks Master Plan and come up with a strategy to either get it re-done or update it since the plan was done in 2005
- Discussed were the alley ways and if the Commission wants to look at them since they are not a park.
- FOSPA stated they are getting funds but the task is to spend it.

Public Comment: L. Sawhney stated she was concerned we keep talking about the \$200,000 and it appears we will have more park funding so would like looking at a longer plan and developing strategies and do a review about the needs for all the parks. It is clear many parks need care and maintenance. Many comments have been made regarding this. We should make sure we have long term funding also.

C. UPDATE ON PROP 68 - PARKS AND WATER BOND

Update on Prop. 68 on Parks and Water Bonds. \$255 million will be awarded to underserved communities in California. Public Hearings in Fall of 2018. Applications due in Spring 2019. \$185 per capita will be available. Staff will keep an eye out for the funding. SB5 and AB31 Bond funding will also be available.

D. DISCUSSION ABOUT THE PROPERTY ON THE CORNER OF BROADWAY AND FREMONT

Broadway and Fremont Property discussion: The City does not own the property and a bank has a lease on it but apparently there is no water. It could potentially be a natural draw to Broadway; it could be a community hub. Staff stated the City is writing a grant to provide an outdoor performing arts area that would be temporary and it could be a hub of activity. Since we don't own it the activities would be created that are essentially portable or temporary. This would help energize that end of the street. It could also be a place/town square for families to sit out under a gazebo but can give Seaside a small town feel.

E. ESTABLISH PRIORITY LIST FOR PARKS REQUIRING NEW PARK SIGNS

Priority list for parks requiring new park signs: There was no print out of a map provided. The Chairman asked for a list of parks that don't have signs. The question was asked are we doing every park. A suggestion was made to use the parks that are used the most. Since there was no information provided the information was tabled for the next meeting. The goal is to prioritize the parks. Suggestion was made from the audience that those parks that have an association associated with them such as Capra should get the signs first. Since they have an association they should be prioritized. Capra, Highland Otis and Durant have support from FOSPA so maybe they could be made the priority. The Chairman asked to have a list of parks that have a sign and those that don't have one for the next regular meeting so they will wait for Dave Fortune to provide a list that can help them prioritize the parks.

A Health Department representative talked about smoking hazards and outdoor smoking issues. The Health Department has resources. Of the six parks in Seaside there were no smoking signs and lots of cigarettes. They suggested the city can request no smoking signs and encouraged city

to apply by email. September is when they revised their budget so that is a good time to do the request. A suggestion was made that the signs could be made and modified to include new rules such and add other rules to the one sign. This would make it less expensive. Also, smaller signs could be considered since they are less expensive. They commended the Commission for what they were hearing about park issues in Seaside. The city's smoking ordinance was discussed: 8.38.0.030 and will have to be updated by the City Council

F. ESTABLISH PRIORITY LIST FOR PARKS FOR INSTALLATION OF DOGGY WASTE STATIONS

Priority list for parks for installation of doggy waste stations: Since the new ordinance now allows dogs in the parks. Staff clarified that dogs are allowed in parks but not on sports fields. Discussed that since the commission has not toured all the parks they need to make sure they have viewed all parks and set up a special meeting on September 10 to view the remaining parks. It was suggested to get public input as to where they should be located. It was suggested that possibly an aerial view might be another view point. Staff will ask.

7. REPORTS FROM RECREATION STAFF

Staff reported that Recreation was starting for school, city birthday and Halloween. The Parks Commission asked if they could have a table. Parking Day was announced for September 22 on the 600 block of Broadway

8. REPORTS FROM PARKS STAFF

Staff reported that many of the city's play structures will have to be removed. In order to replace them the city will need to find funding. In the past the city has leveraged their funds with grant monies to replace the structures but they are expensive. The City will continue to look for funding. The Safe Route to Schools program was announced. Two meeting will be held one at MLK school on September 29 at 6:30 p.m. and September 30 in Marina at Crumpton School. Anybody interested in this topic should plan to attend and provide input. The Commission asked staff if there was a list of the parks that the play structures are planned to be removed and staff stated they would work on that. Any new playground will need to take ADA into consideration.

9. REPORTS FROM COMMISSIONERS

Commissioners discuss Martin Park. (Mendocino and Mingo) Has a nice bench and it's been cleaned up by the neighbors living around it. Someone suggested that they have information related to who is taking care of it and the Commission said they would like to get any information available.

Commission Maxwell asked for the tour to be taken before the next meeting. It was decided to have a special meeting and it was agreed to have it on September 10, 2018. MSP: White/Gray to have a Special Meeting to tour the remaining parks on September 10 at 5:30.
