Our students have built small portable solar-powered electrical stations that can charge electronic devices or have light bulbs connected to them. One of these portable power stations is being sent to power a primary school in Kenya, but we have another station that the students get to decide where it goes.

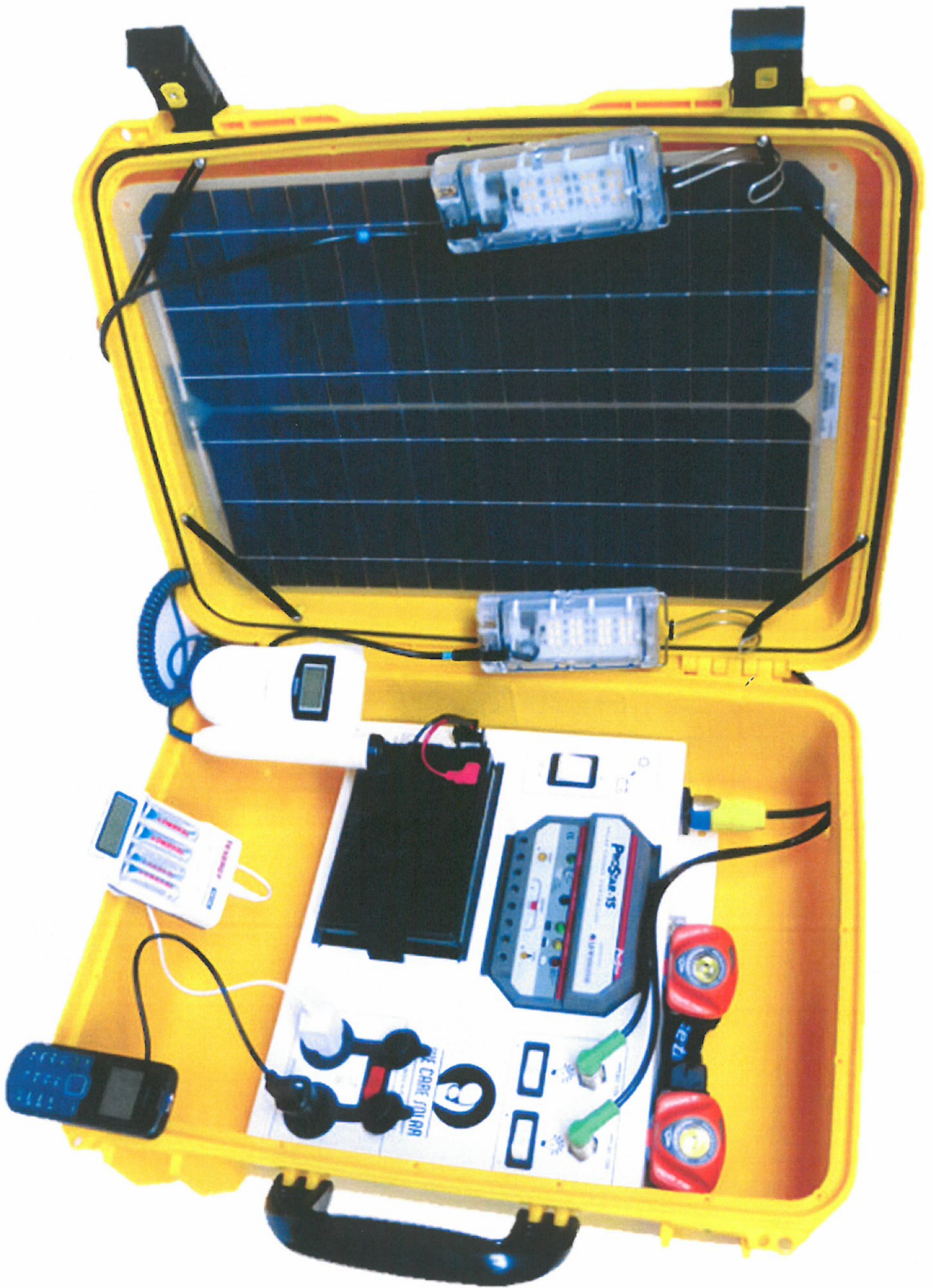
